## **Staycation along Bayou Teche Scenic National Byway Highway 182 from Morgan City to St. Martinville,**

### Day 1

Arrive in Morgan City. Visit the Cajun Coast Welcome Center  
900 Dr. MLK Blvd., Morgan City, LA 70380

The center is the perfect place to start or end your Louisiana adventure in St. Mary Parish. This Cajun Coast a sampler of everything Louisiana offers, in a friendly relaxed atmosphere that is the heart of Cajun hospitality.

### Day 2

Travel to downtown Morgan City to visit the International Petroleum Museum and Exposition and the Oilfield Diver's Monument  
111 First Street, Morgan City, LA 70380

Home of "Mr. Charlie," an authentic offshore drilling rig built in 1952 and open to the public for tours. "Mr. Charlie," designed by industry pioneer A.J. "Doc" LaBorde, was the first transportable, submersible drilling rig in the industry and was used to drill hundreds of offshore wells. The museum also includes interpretive exhibits, artifacts, photographs and documents about Louisiana's offshore petroleum industry. "Mr. Charlie" is the only place in the world where the public can walk aboard an authentic offshore oil rig. After visiting the Mr. Charlie, visit the ROV/Dive Museum located at "Mr. Charlie."

After visiting the Mr. Charlie, walk along Morgan City's Main Street. A map is located at

Morgan City Main Street is a nationally certified Main Street. Walk along the 21 ft. seawall that borders the Atchafalaya River. Visit the Atchafalaya Water Heritage Kiosk to learn more about the Atchafalaya River, the largest distributary of the Mississippi River.

After lunch, visit the Southwest Reef Lighthouse, Everett S. Berry Memorial Lighthouse Park

Southwest Reef Lighthouse is a historic lighthouse built in 1858 at the end of Southwest Reef in Atchafalaya Bay, Louisiana to replace lightships which had been stationed there for ten years. The Lighthouse now permanently resides on the river front in Berwick.

After visiting the Lighthouse Park, visit Berwick's Heritage Museum, 3326 Third Street, Berwick, 985-384-2283. You may need to call to make an appointment. The Everett Berry Lighthouse Park and Brown House tell the story of the Berwick area.

Day 3

Travel to Patterson to the Wedell-Williams Aviation & Cypress Sawmill Museum (A Louisiana State Museum)

The museum serves a dual function -the first highlights the legacy of Louisiana aviation pioneers who formed an air service together in 1928 in Patterson, LA. The Sawmill Museum documents the history of the cypress lumber industry in Louisiana.

After the museum, enjoy a tour on Captain Caviar Swamp Tours, 112 Main Street, Patterson, 985-395-7420, 504-343-5232 (cell). Venture into the Atchafalaya Swamp Basin, the largest overflow swamp in the US with Captain Caviar. Tour is approximately 2.5 hours.

## Day 4

Today, travel to the City of Franklin, Franklin Historic District

The Franklin Historic District contains nearly 420 noteworthy structures and was listed in the National Register of Historic Places on December 29, 1982. Walk or drive the Historic District. [www.cajuncoast.com/listings/franklin-historic-district](http://www.cajuncoast.com/listings/franklin-historic-district). The Franklin Main Street shops are a must see.

Visit Grevemberg House or Shadowlawn, two historic homes open to the public. Grevemberg is a town home of the 1850's that's been authentically restored. Shadowlawn, 906 Main Street, Franklin, 337-828-2092. This Greek Revival home was built in 1850 with a smaller building that once served as a tavern.

Guided tours of the Joseph Jefferson Home (ca. 1870), a grand architectural masterpiece built as a hunting lodge and painting studio for famous 19th century actor, Joseph Jefferson, who portrayed Rip Van Winkle. Rip's Rookery and semi-tropical garden surrounding beautiful Lake Peigneur. Film of the 1980 catastrophe on the lake. Café, B&B and gift shop.

Today, visit St. Martinville and Longfellow Evangeline Park

Longfellow-Evangeline State Historic Site explores the cultural interplay among the diverse peoples along the famed Bayou Teche. Acadians and Creoles, Indians and Africans, Frenchmen and Spaniards, slaves and free people of color all contributed to the historical tradition of cultural diversity in the Teche region. French became the predominant language, and it remains very strong in the region today.
